

Joshua Oh, Fullstack Developer





With the majority of our work being done remotely, it is always a treat when the gang gets together to work in-person. Here are a few moments from our second time getting together!




The First Question:

It produces only a tablet of 21 glyphs... What is the answer?




Tech Tip: Keyboard Shortcuts
